Southern Johnny Cakes

2 cups non-GMO cornmeal (make sure it is very finely ground)

1 tsp salt 3 Tbsp olive oil

2 Tbsp sucanat ½ cup soy or nut milk Mix all these ingredients together. Add 2 cups boiling water.

Add to make a fairly soft batter, but one that will hold its shape. If too thick, add a little extra water. Drop by large spoonfuls onto ungreased griddle and flatten to ½ inch thickness or less. Turn over when it is lightly browned around the edges then cook the other side. Serve with



applesauce or maple syrup. Tip: Make sure the cornmeal is VERY fine—like flour and the water is BOILING or this recipe will not work. If it fails you may add flour to desired consistency.

AGAINST THE CURRENT


Two summers ago our family was privileged to take a canoe trip upriver to a lake where we camped for a few days. It was the first canoe trip we had ever taken like this and the children had been preparing for weeks, making meals and dehydrating them so that we could have healthful food to eat while we were camping. We carefully weighed everything that we would take because we did not want to overload the canoes and have them sink, and we didn't want to have to leave anything necessary behind either.

Despite the most careful preparation however, nothing prepared us for the journey. The park ranger at the starting point told us that

because of the recent rains, it was going to be quite difficult to paddle our way upstream. This turned out to be a severe understatement of the actual facts. Although the beginning of our journey was fairly peaceable, we started coming to sections of the river where the current was so strong that it took all of us (three in each canoe) to get past each point. Each time one of the canoes was able to pass a point it gave us courage to go forward. Then we came to a bend in the river to the right. In order to make the turn, we needed to keep to the right, but the current was so strong it continued pushing our canoe to the left shore. We had to try repeatedly to pass this bend in the river, but finally one and then the other canoe made the turn and passed this point of tribulation.



No sooner had we somewhat recovered from this hard spot however, than we encountered what was to be the hardest stretch of river. Although all of us were paddling as hard as we could, we were actually moving backwards because of the force of the current. Again and again we were pushed back to the same spot only to have to begin again trying to pass this point of tribulation. It became very discouraging to realize that we had been paddling for probably half an hour and we were still in the same place, and had not made any headway during that time. Though I really don't know how, by learning the pattern of the river, praying, persevering, and paddling as hard as we could, we did finally make it past that tempestuous point and were able to enjoy perhaps our most memorable camping trip ever situated in a beautiful





The lessons from this trip are distinct. Nowhere in the Bible is the way to heaven pictured as the easy way. Like paddling upstream we are to "Strive [struggle] to enter in at the strait gate: for many, I say unto you, will seek to enter in, and shall not be able."—Luke 13:24. Jesus told his disciples, "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me."—

Matthew 16:24. "And whosoever doth not bear his cross, and come after me, cannot be my disciple."—Luke 14:27.

Many today feel like they are paddling upstream. Following the Biblical route often means going against the current of popular opinion. Sometimes going the "right" way seems impossible. Some will not endure long to bear the cross against a steady current of opposition, and the opposition will wear

them out completely. It is far easier to pass down with the current than to row upstream. But let us be reminded that it is by the way of the cross, the current against us, that the crown lies.

And yet in the Bible, hope is given. One has gone before to show us that it is possible. Jesus said, "These things I have spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace. In the world ye shall have tribulation: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world." – John 16:33. Upon those who have the endurance of the saints, those who continue to paddle against the current, a blessing is pronounced. "Blessed is the man that endureth temptation: for when he is tried, he shall receive the crown of life, which the Lord hath promised to them that love him." –James 1:12. When we reach our goal on that "Sea of Glass", it will be worth it all.

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PROFITABLE TRADITIONS

Cultivate watchfulness. When there is snow on the ground it is a good time to play the tracking game. Have someone go for a walk in the snow. After a short delay to allow the first person a head start, a second person has to try to find them by following their footprints. This concept may be improvised using rocks and sticks to point out a trail where no snow is available. See what lessons you can learn about following the path of truth and Jesus' footprints. Here are a few we learned:

- You need to learn the distinctive footprint of the person you are following. Jesus footprints bear the mark of self-sacrificing love. "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends." John 15:13, also Psalm 22:16
- Those who follow must walk the same path, under logs, through bushes, etc., or they will get lost. Those who follow Jesus will also be self-sacrificing. Matt. 16:24, 4:19
- When you lose the trail, go back to the last place you saw a footprint. When your life is falling apart, go back to the point where you last saw the Light. "Then spake Jesus again unto them, saying, I am the light of the world: he that followeth me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life." John 8:12
