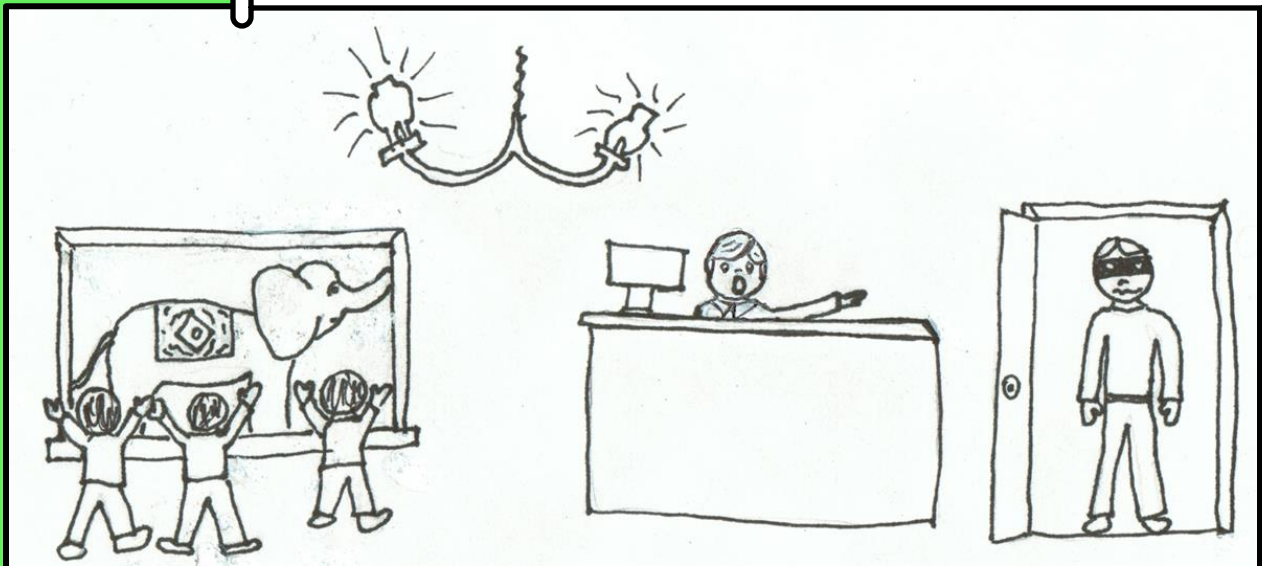

GOD'S AMAZING CREATURES



Black-tailed prairie dogs were so-named because they bark like a dog and live in burrows in shortgrass prairies. They live in eastern Montana and southwest North Dakota south to extreme southeast Arizona, New Mexico, and northwest Texas. Most of the black-tailed prairie dog's diet consists of green plants, including many kinds of grasses. Sometimes they eat insects. The prairie dogs live in groups called towns. A prairie dog town can have up several thousand prairie dogs, and the town can cover 100 acres or more. They sit down on the mounds at the edge of their burrow and watch for danger. If danger is seen, the warning bark is sounded and the prairie dogs dive into the burrows.
